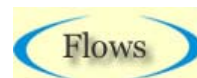

Colorado Data Sharing Network New SWAP schedule

CDSN has the opportunity to organize and host a Data Sharing Network SWAP in your watershed or basin this spring or fall. The target audiences for SWAP events are anyone in a local watershed who is interested and working with water resources, whether generating data or just a data user. A SWAP is a placed based gathering, at a local watershed scale such as the Gunnison River, where entities come prepared to share what they are doing or need done, when, where, how, why and their monitoring and assessment needs and concerns. Presentations can also be given regarding recent studies, projects or work in that basin. The agenda is set by a local team. CDSN creates a watershed team that plans the time, location and agenda of the SWAP and then produces a fact sheet available to all documenting the information exchanged. GOCO Strategic Plan Available for Public Comment

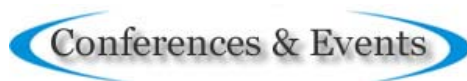

Green infrastructure money available through State Revolving Fund in FY10

American Rivers helped secure important water infrastructure funding for green infrastructure and water efficiency as part of the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA). ARRA required that states use 20% of their allocation under the Clean Water and Drinking Water State Revolving Loan Funds for green infrastructure, water efficiency, energy efficiency and environmental innovation. Grants Preserve Natural Areas in Colorado

Great Outdoors Colorado Trust Fund

The mission of the Great Outdoors Colorado Trust Fund is to help preserve and manage Colorado's wildlife, park, river, trail, and open space heritage. In the spring of 2010, the Fund will provide support through the following grant programs: Local Government Parks and Outdoor Recreation Grants assist in the establishment or expansion of park, outdoor recreation, and environmental education facilities. (Mini-Grants are provided for projects in communities of 5,000 people or less.) Open Space Grants support projects that protect natural areas such as urban open space, wildlife habitat, etc. Conservation Excellence Grants target activities which improve the capacity of land trusts to achieve quality land conservation. Planning Grants help communities develop plans to protect open space, wildlife habitat, and parks. The application deadlines are as follows: Open Space Grants: **February 22, 2010**; Local Government Parks and Outdoor Recreation Grants, Mini-Grants, and Planning Grants: **March 2, 2010**; and Conservation Excellence Grants: **March 8, 2010**. 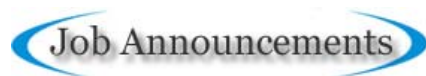
